#### Police hold interstate meeting to step up security for I-Day

NEW DELHI, AUGUST 8 In a bid to bolster security arrangements for the Independence Day celebrations, Delhi Police Commissioner SBK Singh held an important interstate coordination meeting at the police headquarters here

on Friday The meeting was attended by officials from various law enforcement agencies. Senior police officers from Haryana, Punjab, Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Himachal Pradesh, Jharkhand, Uttarakhand, Bihar, Rajasthan and Chandigarh, along with officers from Central intelligence and enforcement agencies, participated in the discussions.

During the meeting, officials shared intelligence inputs and discussed anti-terror measures, including border checking and the verification of suspicious elements. They also deliberated on the threat posed by paragliders, drones and other flying objects entering from open areas.

Emphasis was laid on the need for advanced information regarding the movement of suspicious individuals and vehicles. In light of security concerns in the national capital, the Commissioner called for intensified action against criminal gangs operating in Delhi and the NCR, especially those with international links. through the use of modern technology.

He also stressed the need for a joint action plan and coordinated strategy to tackle such threats. Traffic restrictions for Independence Day and measures to prevent unauthorised border intrusions were also discussed, with officials from other states urged to extend full cooperation for effective implementation, according to a Delhi Police statement.

Such interstate coordination meetings are convened by the Delhi Police every year ahead of Republic Day and Independence Day celebrations in the capital. —TNS

The announcement was made on Friday by Kapil Mishra, Minister for Art, Culture, Language and Tourism, during the inaugural session of the Celebrating India Film Festival (CIFF) at the NCUI Auditorium.

Addressing an audience that included prominent film personalities such as former Union Minister Mukhtar National Abbas Nagyi. Award-winning filmmaker

Madhur Bhandarkar and actors Manoj Joshi and Ishita Bhatt, Mishra said the government's objective is to "position Delhi as the best destination for film production" while enhancing its cultural and tourism appeal. He said a dedicated budget

has been allocated for the upcoming International Film Festival in Delhi. In addition. a Single Window Clearance system would soon be operational to simplify shooting permissions for producers. "This festival is not just about entertainment — it is a celebration of dialogue, identity and creativity," Mishra said, adding that the Delhi Government would continue to support similar large-scale cultural events in the future. Global Foundation and other partners, CIFF 2025 runs until August 10. It brings together filmmakers, artists, and cinema professionals from across India to

showcase work exploring themes such as the environment, wildlife, tourism, herty and patriotism.

Festival highlights include the screening and discussion of India Lockdown, directed by Madhur Bhandarkar and produced by Pranav Jain; special 4K restoration screenings of 'Umrao Jaan' and Manoj Kumar's patriotic classic 'Kranti'; and the world premiere of 'Aham Bharatam', a documentary by Bharatbala, followed by interactive

### Mayor rejects AAP's charges on compassionate appointments, welfare fund disbursement

NEW DELHI, AUGUST 8 Mayor Raja Iqbal Singh on Friday dismissed allegations made by the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) regarding compassionate appointments and the disbursement of the Teacher Welfare Fund in the Municipal Corporation of

Delhi (MCD), calling them

"baseless and misleading."

"Aam Aadmi Party only knows how to indulge in disruptive and petty politics," the Mayor said, accusing the opposition of distorting facts obstructing welfare intended for municipal employees and

their families.

alleged during AAP's tenure in the MCD, which ended in June of last year, 27 eligible dependants of deceased teachers were "made to run from pillar to post" for compassionate

appointments, despite having complete documentation. He claimed the process was deliberately delayed, causing hardship to affected families. He said after the BJP

assumed control of the MCD, the pending cases prioritised and appointment letters were now being issued. "The BJP has always prioritised the welfare of employees and their families," he said.

The Mayor alleged under AAP's administration, 13 eligible dependants of deceased teachers were "deliberately denied" financial assistance from the Teacher Welfare Fund. "This is a shameful act that reflects AAP's apathy and lack of empathy," he said, adding the current BJP-led MCD was disbursing funds directly into beneficiaries' bank accounts with "complete transparency.'

"If AAP truly cared for employees, why were no compassionate appointments made and no welfare funds disbursed during their tenure?" Singh asked.

He also alleged the opposition was attempting to "sabotage" ongoing welfare initiatives under the BJP-led administration. "The people of Delhi can clearly see through their tactics," he added.

### Man get 25 years of RI for raping minor

**GURUGRAM, AUGUST 8** 

A Gurugram court convicted Vikas Yadav for raping a 13year-old girl and sentenced him to 25 years of rigorous imprisonment along with a Rs 60,000 fine. On August 17, 2022, the girl's father reported her abduction and rape to Bilaspur police. An FIR was registered under Section 365 IPC and Section 6 of the POCSO Act. The police arrested Yadav, a native of Allahabad and filed a chargesheet. "The Additional Session Judge Jasmine Sharma sentenced him based on evidence and witness testimony," said a Gurugram police spokesperson. — OC

## IIT-Delhi develops breakthrough method to recycle denim into high-quality garments

NEW DELHI, AUGUST 8

In a significant breakthrough, researchers from method to recycle denim waste into knitted garing on quality.

Led by Prof Abhijit Majumdar and Prof BS Butola of the Department of Textile and Fibre Engineering, the team successfully converted waste denim into yarn with minimal damage to fibre properties by optimising process conditions. The recycled yarn is then blended into knitted fabric using seamless whole-garment technology, resulting in garments containing 25 per cent to 75 per cent recycled yarn.

The LCA showed that recycling could mitigate 30-40 per cent of envi-The team found that up to ronmental impacts such as 50 per cent recycled yarn greenhouse gas emissions,

acid rain and fossil fuel depletion. For ozone layer depletion, the reduction is

as high as 60 per cent. Using recycled fibres also reduces the demand for virgin cotton, thereby saving water, pesticides and fertilisers used in cotton cultivation — a process that alone contributes 24 per cent to global warming among all production stages.

"The team is now exploring the feasibility of recycling textile waste multiple times," said Prof Butola.

India generates about 3.9 million tonnes of post-consumer textile waste annually, of which only 4 per cent is recycled. Most of this waste ends up in landfills due to variability in fibre blends and colours. Mechanical recycling also weakens fibre quality, making it challenging to produce high-quality garments from recycled textiles.

# Exhibition recalls horror of Hiroshima, Nagasaki bombings

NEW DELHI, AUGUST 8 An exhibition 'Remembering

Hiroshima-Nagasaki' was held at the India International Centre (IIC) to mark the 80th anniversary of the 1945 atomic bombings that killed over 200,000 people.

Inaugurated by Japanese Ambassador Ono Keiichi, it featured rare photographs, survivor testimonies and panels tracing the events from the Manhattan Project to the bombings' aftermath.

Ambassador Keiichi noted Japan's commitment to nuclear disarmament and praised India for observing a

moment of silence annually since 1985. IIC president Shyam Saran highlighted the event's role in raising awareness among youth. Students

found the exhibition powerful, especially amid current global tensions, with many describing it as a reminder of the human cost of nuclear warfare. — TNS

ATOM BOMB DROPPED ON NAGASAKI (AUGUST 9, 1945)

### 'Fat Man' in the warroom



N what is considered the most tragic day during World War II, 'Fat Man' — a plutonium bomb — was dropped by US pilot Major Charles Fredrick C Bock on Nagasaki in Japan on August 9, 1945. The US objective was achieved at a tremendous price: 75,000 persons were killed, and the toll rose to 80,000 during the following days.

Within days, on August 15, 1945, Japan announced its unconditional surrender. It was not the first time Japan had been nuked. Three day earlier, 'Little Boy' - a guntype nuclear weapon using Uranium 235 as fissile material — was dropped on Hiroshima on August 6. It was the first-ever nuclear attack in the history of humankind.

According to records of the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty Organisation, Nagasaki was not the primary target, but weather conditions and clouds and smoke from nearby bombing raids had obscured the primary target of Kokura. The American fighter plane was unable to spot the core city arsenal target and the Japanese antiaircraft fighters further compounded the problem.

Civilians at Kokura, who had taken shelter after the air raid warning alert, breathed a sigh of relief, as the US airplane ferrying 'Fat Man' headed for its secondary target, Nagasaki.

The US decision to use the atom bomb again, after the first explosion at Hiroshima, was based on apprehensions that Japan's weather was variable and the appearance of a typhoon or any other major weather phenomenon would force the action to be postponed for a considerably long period.

Two bombings in quick succession was also a strategy to make the Japanese believe that Americans had plenty of atomic devices, thus convincing them to surrender unconditionally

Nagasaki, a port city located about 160 km from Kokura, was larger, with an approximate population of 2,63,000. With some major military facilities, including two Mitsubishi military factories, this important city had not suffered much from conventional bombings.

August 9 comes as a reminder of World War II, which was fought by millions of people, the heavy costs of victory and defeat, and how it changed the course of future wars. There were several battles and military posts at even little-known places, like the Caribbean and Central America, Greenland, Alaska and the
